This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

For Curriculum Music Castle View use the programme Sing up, this is a progressive scheme which starts with sessions in our Nursery all the way up to Year 6 and is taught weekly. The scheme allows children to engage with a wide range of musical experiences and encourages the children to listen to and respond to a wide range of music and artists.

We aim to make music an enjoyable learning experience. We encourage children to participate in a variety of musical experiences through which we endeavour to build up the confidence of all children. Children are given the opportunity to discover, explore and develop technical skills through practical music lessons. This involves both whole class and small group activities.

We use the programme of Sing up to support the teaching of Music. The programme consists of units of work including:

- Six week units which are based around a song, and the musical learning flows from the features of the piece. Taking an integrated approach, these units combine singing and playing, listening and appraising as well as improvising and composing.
- Three week units which are grouped to cover a half term which focus more heavily on composing/improvising or on listening/appraising. These units support pupils to find their own creative voices. The listen and appraise units vary, with some focusing on active ways to listen for deeper and more internalised experience through movement, dance or art activity.

Pupils' understanding of music will be developed through activities which bring together the requirements of performing, composing, listening and appraising. Children are taught to recognise the musical elements of duration, dynamics, pitch, tempo, timbre and texture.

Children are taught to make music together, to understand musical notation, and to compose pieces. They are also taught to sing and play in time controlling the sound

and pace. They are taught different ways to represent sounds graphically and symbolically.

We teach them to listen to and appreciate different forms of music from various backgrounds and cultures. Assembly songs are varied and give children opportunity to experience different musical styles.

In Year 3&4, children are provided with the opportunity to participate in a whole class instrumental teaching scheme which is provided by Derbyshire Music Partnership. These lessons help the children to further develop their skills in making music together and understanding musical notation. After learning an instrument for fifteen weeks the children perform to the school or their parents and carers.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

At Castle View, we have a choir after school which all children can attend. The choir is led by Vicky Weston-Taylor and runs after school weekly. The choir learn a wide range of songs and this year will perform at school events such as the Christmas Fair.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Every Wednesday, the whole school take part in a Singing Assembly. The children learn a wide range of songs and enjoy singing as a whole school.

During the school year, all children have the opportunity to take part in a show or production. At Christmas, Nursery sing for their parents, Reception and KS1 children take part in a nativity based show including acting and singing and KS2 children take part in a music led show. Families are invited to see the children's performances throughout the year, free of charge.

This year all classes, from Reception to Year 6 will attend a Pantomime at Buxton Opera House, the children enjoy watching a professional performance with acting and singing.

The Year 5 & 6 class, are annually invited to the local, feeder high school to watch the production that has been produced by the children.

As a school, we host a Music afternoon to celebrate different musical styles and take part in the annual singing extravaganza, Sing Up Day. It's a special day we set aside each year to celebrate the joy and power of song with a specially commissioned anthem that is recorded by each school and uploaded to create a world wide choir version. During this afternoon, members of school staff who enjoy performing, also share their own musical interests with the children.

In the future
